Father's Desk: Pentecost

June 23rd is the great feast of Pentecost! We once again invoke the Holy Spirit by praying "O Heavenly King..."

We stopped this prayer at Pascha and have hungered in anticipation. We begin every Liturgy – apart from this 50-day period – with this prayer. We specifically pray to the Holy Spirt in every Liturgy. Including the 25 times we pray in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, we pray to Him 45 times in each Liturgy.

St. Peter quotes in Acts Chapter 2, at the very beginning of his homily to the crowd at Pentecost: "But this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel" and he then quotes from Joel: "And it shall come to pass in the last days, says God, That I will pour out of My Spirit on all flesh...upon My menservants and on My maidservants, I will pour out My Spirit in those days...and whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

We are called to create a wonderful dwelling place within our hearts where He will be pleased to dwell! St. Seraphim of Sarov famously said, "the acquisition of the Holy Spirit is the goal of the Christian life." Christ sent us the Holy Spirit, who proceeds from the Father and is everywhere present and filling all things.

How do we attract the Holy Spirit into our hearts and make a home for Him to abide within us? Repentance, accepting the forgiveness of God, forgiving others, squashing pride, and learning humility, and above all loving each other, these are the requirements that God asks of us.

The Holy Spirit can not dwell in a heart that harbours unforgiveness, so it is especially important that we search our hearts to make sure we are clean in this area.

How do we recognize the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives? It is by the very gentle fruits of the Spirit; (Gal: 5:22,23) "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control;" not by elevated spiritual feelings or great spiritual insights. We all need love and acceptance in far greater measure than correction.

Christ tells us in the Gospel reading: "If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink. He who believes in Me, as the scripture has said, out of his heart shall flow rivers of living water."



May God bless, and may we be a welcome home for the Holy Spirit; that these living waters may flow abundantly to the thirsting world around us. There is no water rationing in the kingdom of heaven. Let us share with all and drink to saturation!

Spirit and Truth

This month we have the Gospel reading from St. John of the Samaritan woman (St. Photini, who went on to be a great evangelist and came to be called 'equal to the Apostles') at the well.

The Samaritans came from the "other" 10 tribes of Israel. When the tribe of Judah along with the tribe of Benjamin returned from the Babylonian captivity (about 6th Cent. BC), and began rebuilding the Temple in Jerusalem, the Samaritans' offer of help was scornfully rejected. The Samaritans built their own temple, but the Jews destroyed it. So we see there was some serious bad blood between the two nations.

It is remarkable that Christ being a Jew, is even here in Samaria. The first thing the woman at the well says to Him is "...Jews have no dealings with Samaritans." Ouite the understatement. Christ points out the Samaritan woman's past multiple husbands and her present "not married" situation to her. But rather than defending herself, the woman reveals her great thirst for spiritual truth. "Sir, I perceive that you are a prophet." She then asks the question burning in her soul. "Who is right, the Jews or the Samaritans? Where does God want to be worshipped? How do we do it right?"

Christ's humanity is descended directly from the Jew's, and He is of course the source of all salvation, so He answers, "...salvation is of the Jew's."

"But the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth; for the Father is seeking such to worship Him."

Everything has now changed as Christ has come. Through the prayers of St. Photini, may we answer the call of Him who seeks all to worship Him in spirit and in truth.

When spirit and truth unite, it is like a great fireplace which warms all who come close. The good solid dry wood stacked in the safety of the fireplace is the truth, the solid doctrine which has been carefully passed down to us through all the ages, from the Apostles through all the saints. The flame is the spirit. Truth however remains dead and lifeless or even worse, cruel and judgemental without the flame of the Spirit!



But spirit running enthusiastically outside of the fireplace, the boundaries of the truth, produces either a flash in the pan which quickly goes out, or worse, ignites anything in its path, having no discretion for the type of material (truth) it consumes. This produces a frenzied destructive fire that eventually crashes and burns out, taking along friends and family as casualties.

Only Christ is the way, the truth and the life, and only as we unite with Him in communion and in spirit and truth are we brought to life and able to truly find life!

CHURCH SCHOOL - The Ascension of our Lord

If one read the four Gospels as if they were four separate biographies of Jesus, one might be forgiven for thinking that the Ascension narrated the end of the story. We have read narratives of Christ's birth, His baptism, His temptation in the wilderness, His ministry, His crucifixion, His resurrection, and now at the last we come the narrative of His ascension, concluding the story of His life with a heavenly happy ending. Everyone loves a happy ending, and this one rounds out the story of Jesus by saying in effect, "And He lived happily ever after at the right hand of God."

But the ascension was not the ending of a story, it was the beginning of one, not the conclusion of Christ's life so much as the beginning of the life of the Church.

The temptation is to regard the Holy Ascension as if Christ has gone away. It is not so. While He walked the earth, the apostles could be with Him, but there were times when they were not with Him. When He was not physically in Judea, for example, Mary and Martha could not be with Him. Now that He has been exalted to the Father's right hand and has sent His Spirit, we can be near Him always, for His presence is no longer conditioned by time and space. Everyone can now be close to Jesus and by the power of the Spirit can be with Him every waking hour and even every sleeping hour. The ascension and the sending of the Spirit means that we now have more of Jesus, not less of Him. The challenge for us now is to live as children of the ascension, and as children of the Spirit. Our Lord's presence and power are always available to us. The question is: how often do we avail ourselves of them?

Or What does the word Pentecost mean?

Pentecost is simply the Greek word for fifty. Pentecost comes 50 days after Easter. The significance of this is that even in the Old Testament (Leviticus 25), the number 50 was special. This is because seven is the number of fullness or completion (God rested on the seventh day, after the six days of Creation). 7 x 7 is therefore a particular sign of fullness and 50 is of course 7 x 7 + 1. By adding one to seven, we reach eight. Eight is seen as the number of what is beyond the fullness of this world, beyond Creation, beyond created time and space, what is part of the age to come, 'the eighth day'. The Descent of the Holy Spirit from heaven is the sign of the other world, the age to come, 'the eighth day', penetrating into this world. That is why baptisteries were, and still are, octagonal. They symbolize the person baptized entering into the other world, becoming a citizen of the Kingdom to come, 'the eighth day'. (read the answers to more questions at orthodoxengland.org.uk)
